Come along to this interactive workshop with Associate Professor Tanya Evans to discuss your work on family history, local history, memory and material culture.

Guest Speakers



Debra Adelaide's literary career commenced in the late 1980s, and since then she has been a freelance writer, book reviewer, editor, researcher, and an academic. She studied at the University of Sydney, where she also worked as a tutor in the English department in the early 1980s and completed a doctorate in Australian literature in 1990. At the University of Technology, Sydney, she is now an associate professor, where her students exist in ever-growing and talented numbers. At home the number of children has decreased and the number of dogs has increased, but she is still the proud mother of Joe, Elle and Callan, and grandmother to Pippa. Debra's books include *The Hotel Albatross*, *The Household Guide to Dying* and her latest short story collection *Zebra & Other Stories*.



Tim Ayliffe has been a journalist for almost 20 years and is the Managing Editor of Television and Video for ABC News. He has also worked as TV News Editor for ABC News and the Executive Producer of ABC News Breakfast. Prior to 2006, Tim worked in London for Sky News as a digital and television journalist. *The Greater Good* is the first book in a three-book series featuring John Bailey. His second book *State of Fear* is out in August. When he's not writing or chasing news stories, Tim rides bikes and surfs.



Meg Keneally worked as a public affairs officer, sub-editor, freelance feature writer, reporter, and talkback radio producer, before co-founding a financial service public relations company, which she then sold after having her first child. For more than ten years, Meg has worked in corporate affairs for listed financial services companies, and doubles as a part-time scuba diving instructor. She is co-author with Tom Keneally of *The Soldier's Curse*, *The Unmourned*, *The Power Game*, and *The Ink Stain*, the first four books in The Monsarrat Series. *Fled*, is her debut solo novel – an epic historical adventure based on the extraordinary life of convict Mary Bryant. She lives in Sydney with her husband and two children.



Born in West Virginia and raised in Florida, **Summer Land** graduated magna cum laude from Emerson College in Boston in 2008 where she studied Marketing. After embarking on a working holiday in Australia and spending two ski seasons in Park City, Utah, Summer moved to Australia in 2010 where she settled down in Mudgee, NSW and began writing. Inspired by Sloane Crosley, Chelsea Handler and David Sedaris, Summer first started blogging, but quickly learned she had a book inside of her. *Summerlandish: Do As I Say, Not As I Did*, was published in 2013, which prompted numerous writers' and readers' festival appearances across Australia. Today, Land writes a column in the *Mudgee Guardian* and is a regular contributor to *The Tot*. Her second book is titled *I Now Pronounce You Husband and Expat*.



Central West Libraries readers will be familiar with **Felicity McLean's** latest book *The Van Apfel Girls are Gone* chosen as the One Library, One Book read for 2019. Felicity is a writer and a journalist. Her writing has appeared in *The Good Weekend*, the *Daily Telegraph*, the *Herald Sun*, the *Big Issue* and more. Her successful book, *Body Lengths*, was co-written with Olympian Leisel Jones. It won the 2016 Australian Book Industry Awards 'Reader's Choice' for Small Publisher Adult Book of the Year, and it was Apple iBook's 'Best Biography of 2015'. As a ghostwriter she has collaborated with celebrities, sports stars, business leaders and many others.
